

Evaluation Report



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Background

Following the closure of the 2014-2020 LEADER programme, Local Action Groups in Scotland were allocated Community Led Local Development (CLLD) funding by the Scottish Government. This funding gives local communities the power to tackle their own, local challenges. The Scottish Borders Local Action Group (LAG) work collaboratively to help rural communities thrive through community-led initiatives. As there were previously no mechanism for young people to be involved in the Scottish Borders LAG, their priority for 2022/23 was to develop a new "Borders Youth Local Action Group" (Borders Youth LAG) to represent the wider community and help tackle one of the most unrepresented and challenged groups. In June 2022, Scottish Borders Council, the lead partner in the Scottish Borders LAG, approached YouthBorders to explore the development of the new Borders Youth LAG. YouthBorders supported the delivery of Borders Youth LAG and managed the administration of the fund. This project ran from October 2022 to March 2023.

Borders Youth LAG is a voluntary youth participation and leadership group of young people aged 16-26 who live, work or study in the Scottish Borders. This new group is a youth decision-making forum for rural community development in the Scottish Borders. Scottish Borders LAG made available £20,000 of their CLLD funding for capital investment to be distributed by the Youth LAG in the first quarter of 2023. This group is a vehicle for powerful and continued learning, including development of organisational and personal change, political skills and knowledge, as well as changes in attitudes, values and enhancement of self-esteem and sense of personal efficiency. Young people volunteer their time to participate in social action to make a positive difference to their community.



About YouthBorders

YouthBorders is the network of voluntary and community-based youth organisations in the Scottish Borders, supporting and promoting good quality youth work. As a membership organisation YouthBorders facilitates networking opportunities and events, and provides information and advice to organisations, their volunteers, trustees, youth workers and other partners in the community. YouthBorders is recognised regionally as the strategic voice of third sector youth organisations and works closely with partners in the public sector to improve outcomes for young people.

Recruitment and Engagement of Young People

With assistance from our freelance communications specialist (Lisa Cowan at Dynamite Initiatives), YouthBorders put out an open call in September 2022 for young people aged 16 to 26 to join the Borders Youth LAG. We approached stakeholders, YouthBorders membership network and utilised YouthBorders e-bulletin, website and social media platforms to encourage those from a range of backgrounds to get involved. Young people were directed to use an online form to register their interest to join the Youth LAG.

Initially, three males aged 16 to 26 and six females aged 21 to 25 registered their interest. However, due to young people's availability, one male and four females remained committed throughout the project. Young people were supported using a confidential check list to help determine whether they faced any personal, socio-economic, financial or transport barriers prior to participation.

Borders Youth LAG Delivery

Borders Youth LAG met regularly on Thursday evenings over 11 sessions using a hybrid model of online and in-person group meetings at a central location in Kelso. The vision and priorities for the fund were decided by the young people: "We want to invest in you and your ideas. If you are under 30, have a great idea which you believe will make a positive impact on the Scottish Borders community, economy, or environment then we want to hear from you".

Youth LAG Fund Priorities:

"We encourage you to apply for ideas that meet one of more of our priorities:"

- Mental Health and Wellbeing
- Rural Poverty
- Cost of Living (group applications only)
- Business & Enterprise
- Community



Young people also co-designed and developed grant-making tools and frameworks, application guidance and form, application scoring system, engaged in peer-to-peer learning from other established Youth LAGs, took lead on decision making to allocate funding, and followed-up with successful applicants to put their ideas into action.

"Attending the first session alone has given me confidence as it showed me that I can try new things. It has taken a lot of confidence to keep going and share my ideas. This will help me in the future to step put my comfort zone". – young person

"Choosing to join the Youth LAG was a bold move and I have realised the benefits of reaching out and seizing this novel experience. Not only has this journey enriched my life as a young adult, it has inspired me to make changes in Borders communities" – young person

Who we've funded

Borders Youth LAG were thrilled to receive 36 funding applications, requesting over £38,000. Youth LAG made the decision to fund a total of 21 individuals and groups. Youth LAG discovered that the young people of the Scottish Borders have an abundance of amazing ideas, and they wished they could have funded them all. Some funded ideas include a pop up refill shop selling recyclable, eco-friendly cleaning products in Duns, a new cooker for young people to use at Escape Youth Café and a free Community Resource Exchange pop up shop for transgender individuals. These projects reflect incredible levels of youth innovation and talent, as well as an impressive sense of community. Learning Experiences

Youth LAG Co-operation Project in Orkney

Borders Youth LAG were invited to join the rest of Scotland's Youth LAG network in Orkney for a three day residential in February 2023. The residential involved of a mixture of staff, young adults, Youth LAGs and local authority members from Cairngorms, Fife, Forth Valley & Lomond, Outer Hebrides, Orkney and Scottish Rural Action. The focus of the residential was to develop a youth voice. Young people gave presentations in their groups to inspire each other and share their learning, and participated in interactive workshops where they problem-solved together. Young people also enjoyed exploring Skara Brae, Ring of Brodgar and Scapa Beach where they created film content for their evaluation video.

"This was my first time on a plane since I was a baby, I'm buzzing to see what Orkney is like."

"I felt so nervous before the presentation but I can't believe I spoke in front of that many people and we answered the questions well as a group. I have learned how to present myself to others."

"If we didn't join up the other Youth LAG's we'd never have known about the other opportunities coming up and we've learned loads from everyone."



Aviemore Youth LAG Residential

Youth LAG travelled to Aviemore for their second residential in March, where they celebrated their achievements through exciting group activities including ice skating, quad bike trekking and marshmallow toasting. The group had focused time for project evaluation and discussions for next steps and future Youth LAG plans. After building new connections in Orkney, the Youth LAG were also visited by Cairngorms Youth LAG in Aviemore, where they were able to further develop relationships, share learning and discuss plans and aspirations for the future.


